Shapely Extraction

This class will explore the process of utilizing simplified forms and what that means for creating an image or developing abstraction. Becoming aware of ranging possibilities for shapes between three and two dimensions allows one to better construct images and provides material for experimentation. Learn to develop an eye for how shapes work together and strategies for paint application that produces intentional edges. What decisions are made to simplify forms? What is omitted and what dominates? How is distillation different from exaggeration?
